2001: A Brace (and Limb) Odyssey

March 31st will see a very special venue for the Ohio Chapter AAOP. The Chapter is presenting an exciting slate of presenters and cutting edge topics relevant to today's and tomorrow's practice in O&P.

Ron Kidd, (President, American Orthopedics, Inc.), president of the newly formed Ohio Orthotics, Prosthetics and Pedorthics Licensing Board will open the session with an update on proceedings of the OOPPLB and what this means to practitioners. Many in the industry are interested in hearing how and

when licensure must be obtained, and, more urgently, how they can be "grandfathered" under the current licensing provisions. Kidd will respond to all questions.

Later in the program, Kevin Carroll (Vice President of Prosthetics, Hanger Orthopedic Group, Inc.) will review the why of licensure in "What Licensed Practioners Have to Offer Consumers".

Earlier in the day, Carroll will present a detailed overview of "Proximal Femoral Focal Deficiency (PFFD)". In this presentation, Carroll will cover not only the

technical aspects of PFFD, but the psychological implications for the patient as well.

Opening presenters will be, Michael Schuch, C.P.O., F.A.A.O.P. (*Director/Assistant* Professor, Duke University Medical Center, Department of Prosthetics and Orthotics), and Mike Tompkins (President, Animated Prosthetics, Inc.). Schuch is a name familiar to many O&P professionals. He is the Immediate Past President of AOPA, Past-president fo the Academy, past



The Ohio Orthotic-Prosthetic & Pedorthic Licensure Board Begins Work

Complete Board Has Now Been Appointed by Governor's Office.

Appointment of all members of the Ohio Orthotic, Prosthetic and Pedorthic Licensure Board is now complete, with the recent appointment of the consumer member, Mr. Steve LaForge, Esq.

Ron Kidd, CPO, (American Orthopedics, Columbus) was elected to serve as President of the Board, which also includes the following individuals who have been appointed to serve on the board:

Michael Marmer, BOC, CPed,Vice President (Cincinnati); Jack Reser, CPed, Secretary (Bellefontaine); Dr. Tom Lee, (Columbus); Mark Horwitz, CO, (Dayton); Julie Bush, BOC, (Columbus).

Appointments were made from recommendations submitted by various groups, including the Ohio Orthotics and Prosthetics Association, The Ohio Chapter, American Academy of Orthotists and Prosthetists, Prosthetic Orthotic Licensure Advocates and the National Association of Manufacturers.

As is customary practice for the operation of a state board, a representative of the Attorney General's office has also been assigned to work with the board and will attend

all meetings of the board in an advisory capacity.

Members of the initial board have staggered lengths of terms but the successive terms will be three-year terms. Board members may not serve more than two consecutive terms and must maintain qualifications and licensure required under the law for appointment.

Work has begun by the board in order to comply with requirements of the law regarding board formation and operation.

Board meetings were held on February 21 and 28 and a day-long meeting has been scheduled for March 10 to begin the process of writing rules and developing the licensure application process.

During the first meeting of the Board, Sallie. DeBolt, the Assistant Attorney General, presented orientation for the board members. She explained that the primary role of a regulatory board is to protect the public and insure minimum standards for public health, safety and welfare. She also spoke about the role of a board member, aspects of legal liability and the ethics law overview.

The first important items of business for the board have been identified as: 1) developing a

budget, 2) hiring a director, 3) locating office space, and 4) developing an application process and setting of fees.

In addition to the "housekeeping" items of business involved with creating a new board, the board will also be responsible for all administrating rules to support and clarify the statue created by the licensure bill, R.C. 4779.16.

Practitioners who wish to become licensed under provisions of the grandfathering clause will have 270 days from the effective date of the law to apply for licensure once the application process is in place, or until July 28, 2001. The law became effective October 27, 2000 and originally allowed for a 180-day grandfathering period. That timeframe was extended by 90 days. The Board has set a goal to have applications distributed sometime in May.

chair of US-ISPO, and former Editor of JPO. Schuch's practice for the past several years has been devoted to upper limb myoelectric fittings. Mike, and his colleague, electronics wizard, Michael Tompkins, President and founder of Animated Prosthetics, Inc. are setting the pace in development of upper limb myoelectric devices. Their work has been featured on a number of national television broadcasts, most recently, on an episode of the Discovery Channel's "Millennium Medicine" series "I", as well as the Discovery Channel's acclaimed "Hospital" series, "Episode 12: A Whole New Life". Together, Schuch and Tompkins will lead off the Spring Technical Meeting with an overview of their recent work in this breakthrough technology.

An interactive panel presentation moderated by Ohio Chapter-AAOP Immediate Past President, Mark Bondurant will review "Clinical Experiences with the C-Leg". Panelists include; Randy Daniel, C.P. (OrPro-LaForsch Orthopedic Laboratories), Manuel R. Garcia, C.P. (President, Manuel Garcia Prosthetics Lab, Inc.), Ronald L. Kidd, C.P.O. (President, American Orthopedics, Inc.), and Glen Schober, C.P. (Vice President, Yates & Schober, Inc.).

Deanna Fish, M.S., C.P.O. (Clinical Educator, Orthomerica Products, Inc.) is widely recognized nationally as a trainer and as a "professional among professionals" in O&P. The Ohio Chapter has been fortunate to have her present at several meetings in the past. Attendee responses have always shared excitement about having heard her presentations. This year, Deanna will present on "Cranial Remolding Orthoses". Fish's description of her presentation is, "These orthoses are indicated for infants 3-18 months of age and are

fabricated from a custom mold of the infant's head. This lecture will provide an overview of cranial anatomy, definitions and terminology, indications and contra-indications, patient evaluation, management of tortocollis as it relates to plagiocephaly, and fitting and follow-up procedures."

Jim Walker, C.O., (Senior Instructor, Boston Brace International, Inc. — Director, National Orthotics and Prosehetics Compnay of Pennsylvania) will present on "Hybrid Orthoses for Neuromuscular Scoliosis". Jim will review some of the new and existing materials in orthoses for scoliosis and when and how each is indicated for use.

Frank Friddle, C.O., (President, Friddle's Orthopedic Appliances) will present a brief, but very informative dual-topic session entitled "Plastics in Orthotics and Use of Color in Orthotics". Frank's description of his program is; "Characteristics, both physical and

thermal as well as proper handling, disposal and working techniques will be reviewed. Material safety data will be distributed, and nomenclature discussed."

Frank Friddle represents the third generation in his family in the field of Orthotics and Prosthetics. He holds graduate and postgraduate credentials from Clemson University and a certificate in orthotics from Northwestern University. He has served as President of the South Carolina Society of Orthotics and Prosthetics as well as President of AOPA Region IV. He now devotes a good deal of time with ABC as a member of the Orthotic CPM Exam Committee and has also served as a member of AOPA's Membership and Marketing Committee as well as AOPA's Supplier Committee.

James H. Campbell, Ph.D., C.O., rounds out this very strong program with, "Stance Controlled Orthotic Knee Joints". Campbell's presentations will examine the current status of stance controlled orthotic knee joints by providing an overview of two current, and ongoing research projects addressing this common clinical problem. The function of the knee joint structures, as they relate to stability

and knee motion during the gait cycle, will be reviewed.

Dr. Campbell currently serves as the Director of Research & Product Development for Becker Othopedic. He earned his Ph.D. in Bioengineering, with his doctoral research being, "The Orthotic Management of Pediatric Paraplegia: A clinical and biomechanical analysis". He is also a past editor of the Journal for Prosthetics and Orthotics.

Prior to working with Becker,
Dr. Campbell served four years as
Director of Orthotics and Prosthetics
at the Cleveland Clinic Foundation.
He has presented at regional and
national conference and at AAOP
CEC conferences by invitation.
Campbell is also author of the
chapter, "Orthoses for Spinal Cord
Injury" in the American Academy
of Orthopaedic Surgeons Atlas of


